



#### WILDLIFE ON THE HIGH LINE

The Painted Lady is one of several types of butterfly that can be seen on the High Line. Many different birds have been spotted in the park, including woodpeckers, finches, mourning doves, house wrens, yellow warblers, song sparrows, and a peregrine falcon. More than 200 species of bees have been recorded in New York City, and many can be seen foraging along the High Line during the spring and summer months. Visitors have also reported hearing crickets, an odd sound in the midst of a bustling city. The Hudson River is a major migratory corridor for birds, and some 300 species — including songbirds, raptors, waterfowl, and shorebirds — pass through town each year on their northern migration.
